From the launch in July 2007, Beholdance has three operating youth chapters in North Carolina and is looking to expand. We have grown from 7 members to 159.

The Kannapolis Chapter membership is growing at each meeting and the group is working seamlessly together to create outstanding service projects. The Asheboro Chapter is growing as well as



—their seniors are moving on to college and handing down their positions to other youth leadership. It is exciting to see the growth taking place. Some of our rising seniors are making an impact at their colleges.

To share a few of the numbers, we have topped 4578 Volunteer Service Hours since the inception. Beholdance youth have packaged over 13,680 pet meals for pets in need. They have sponsored surgeries for 4 children through the smile train and are getting ready to sponsor several more through recycling aluminum cans. We have sponsored children in Africa by providing vitamins to their clinic. Beholdance is gearing up for the launch of the first shipment of clothes for Ramona's Closet to Mexico in July 2010

where it will link youth in the US to youth in Mexico. Wildlife is safer and the Environment has been touched by caring young hands that have set out to make a difference locally and globally. Join us as we celebrate three years of success in conservation and community service managed by youth.




Airgun Seismic Surveys

Also a resident Red Tail Hawk was seen soaring overhead down hear the towers and a feisty Canadian Goose appears to have taken up residence in Tom's Pond near Caremoor.

Palacio had learned that three Umbono pre-schools and one local clinic that Umbono created had children in need. To assist, the Beholdance youth created an environmental / conservation themed float to educate youth on the parade route about reuse, renew and recycling, one of Beholdance educational conservation messages. The group received second place in the civic category in both the Concord and Kannapolis Holiday Parades. Beholdance youth elected to allocate the prize money to a South African Service Project to help other children by purchasing vitamins to improve the health of their pre-school children.



Tim Morley at Cannon Pharmacy assisted with getting the most out of the prize money as well as donated an additional 25 bottles to the cause. Jordan Whitley, a regular visitor to South Africa with Umbono, delivered the Beholdance vitamins to the Manguzi Hospital's HIV/AIDS Clinic to the care of the physician-in-charge, Dr. Colin Pfaff. Due to education and extreme need in the area, the Umbono professionals, including Nic Vaughan-Hones - Umbono's "man-on-the-ground" chose to have the vitamins dispensed out of the local medical clinic to ensure the children most in need receive them and that there would be no waste. "Dr. Pfaff was very happy to get them," shared Davis.

Beholdance Youth Changing Twelve Lives

Since the launch of Beholdance, one of the charities of choice selected by the youth members is The Smile Train, a leading cleft lip and palate repair organization.

The 2007-2008 Beholdance first year, the youth sponsored one surgery by recycling aluminum cans and using those funds to sponsor the surgery. They second year, the group was challenged by the economic down-turn and aluminum dropped from .60 a pound to around .22 a pound. This made it more difficult to do a complete surgery through recycling so the group held a quilt raffle as well as launched several individual service projects in local neighborhoods and schools to increase the can collections and funds. In 2008-2009, the Kannapolis youth were able to sponsor three surgeries.

This year, 2009-2010, with the economy still struggling the Beholdance youth members were able to raise enough through the recycling program to pay for one surgery. These collections included community can donations from First Bank, CISTECH and from other neighbors and Beholdance youth members.

To get the most out of the funds raised, Dakota Palacio called and spoke with leaders at the Smile Train to see if they were hosting any match grants and found out they were going to be holding a Triple Match near the last week of May through June 2nd. With this knowledge, Dakota went out to friends, family and neighbors that have been helping with the Beholdance recycling program and shared the news of the coming Triple Match. Many which feel strongly about the Smile Train and their mission as well as in support of Dakota and Beholdance made cash donations to take advantage of the match and the ability to help more children. With the extra effort, Dakota raised \$750 to add to the groups \$250. May 25th, a letter with a Triple Match Voucher and a total of \$1000 was mailed to the Smile Train in Washington, DC to sponsor a total of 12 surgeries. This will help children that have been waiting for surgeries to repair their clefts.

Beholdance is proud to sponsor these surgeries and is thankful for the Triple Match Sponsor, which helps to change more young lives. The youth hope to continue to sponsor for years to come.



Watch Out For Wildlife

We live in an age where forest and wildlife areas are being greatly challenged. Many of the natural areas where wildlife thrive is being paved over for shopping malls and residential developments. Beholdance youth is asking you to take an extra minute to watch

PASS WITH CARE out for wildlife that is in the road way. Countless pets and other native wildlife are injured or killed by cars and trucks each day. With busy schedules and trying to meet deadlines or timelines, we all lose track of the little ones

trying to make it around us that have alternative transportation options, such as hoof, wing or paw. This methods of transportation do not keep up with the 55+ mph cars and trucks we drive.

So make a promise and pass with care.

Watch out for wildlife in your area.

Ways you can assist...

Eastern Box Turtles

Eastern Box Turtles are starting to rapidly decline in numbers due in majority to traffic injuries or death. These slow moving land turtles do not understand, 'Get out of the road.' They are territorial and remain in the same area. they are the only land turtle found in North Carolina and slow to mature and have very few offspring per year. With the roadside challenges, this is making the numbers of turtles drop rapidly and conservation groups are trying to raise awareness.

If you see a box turtle crossing the road, take time to move it out of the road, in the direction it is headed. Please watch for traffic as the roadside often doesn't prove much safer for humans. If you cannot stop, please take extra precaution to not hit the turtle.

Their survival as a species depends on it.

No Butts

Another roadside hazard for many species is caused by cigarettes being tossed out the car window. If the cigarette is still lit it can create a fire, especially in dry



seasons. The cigarette butts are just as big of an issues. Small animals tend to use the filter material for nest and while at the roadside they attract raptors and other birds of prey. These large birds are very single focused and if they are hunting they do not see the oncoming vehicle. They are often too large to lift off quickly and as a result get struck by the passing car or truck. Raptors have hollow bones and an injury like this is often fatal. Those few that do survive the hit too often end up abandoned on the roadside and left to starve or die of their injuries. This can be avoided by keeping your butts in the car and emptying them when you stop for gas or when you clean out your car. This is true for food and other litter.

Snakes, Frogs and Deer

Other native wildlife may be more prominent on the roadside during certain conditions. Before or after a rain storm, snakes and frogs are found in the road. This is because they are headed to higher ground. Please do not squeal your tires over a snake as it only injuries the reptile and puts other passengers on the road in danger. Deer are more common in the early morning and late evenings on the roadside as well as in foggy weather so be on the lookout for these large animals. Trust us, you don't want a deer as a passenger in your car or to be a hit and run. It creates a great deal of damage to your vehicle and to the animal.

The Beholdance Promise

Make a promise to yourself and to the planet to watch out for wildlife and environmental challenges in our area. Make a commitment to consolidate your route when driving to help save energy and gas. Also promise to slow down and help protect local wildlife.
